# No more Letterman Top Ten lists, says Mrs. Brown



Despite its great popularity among Martin Kellogg students, Friday's *Living Room Times Top Ten Edition* got some negative attention as well, from Kellogg principal Amzie Brown.

Mrs. Brown got a copy of the special *Living Room Times* edition, which was being sold to students for  $10\phi$ a copy on Friday. She had two objections to it.

One was that the newspaper was being sold on school grounds. The other involved the content of the edition, which included Top Ten lists written by students at

Kellogg, as well as those written by David Letterman.

Brendan Loy, chief editor of *The Living Room Times*, was called down to the office during the second eighth grade class of the day. At that point, Brendan had already sold about twenty or twenty-five copies of the newspaper, and given away about fifteen free copies to students who had helped write the newspaper by contributing Top Ten lists.

Mrs. Brown told Brendan that, first of all, he was not allowed to sell the newspapers on school grounds. Brendan said that he had looked through the student handbook several weeks earlier, and had found no rule specifically banning the sale of items in school. Mrs. Brown responded that the rule is a Board of Education policy, and is not in the student handbook. Brendan agreed to stop selling the newspapers.

Second, Mrs. Brown pointed out that some of the Top Ten lists in the newspaper were "dirty." Brendan said that the teachers mentioned in the MKMS Top Ten lists found the jokes humorous and were not offended. Mrs. Brown said that MKMS Top Ten lists are okay to be printed in the future, provided Brendan gets permission from anyone mentioned in the lists. She also said, however, that Brendan is not to print Top Ten lists from "The Late Show With David (Continued on page 2)


"Now we have to have forty-minute Algebra, instead of twenty minutes," Brendan Loy complained.
