

Athletics wound up with 5 game points and the #2-seed.

In the other game, the Astros, who had been winless in their first five games, clobbered the Expos 8-1. The Astros, who lost their first three games and tied their last two before this one, end the regular season in a tie for third place with the Expos. But since the Expos (2-4-0) have one more win than the Astros (1-3-2), the Astros will get the #4-seed despite the big win.

The semifinals on May 30 will feature two games: #1 Angels vs. #4 Astros and #2 Athletics vs. #3 Astros. The order of those games is unknown.

The winners will play each other in the championship game on June 2.

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clinch if they tie the Rockies, and the Mets beat or tie the Giants.

The Padres' win on Monday put them at the head of the pack contending for the final playoff spot. The Giants and Rockies are also in the running for that spot, but if the regular season ended today, it would be the Padres as the #4-seed.

In addition to clinching playoff spots, if the Mets win and the Dodgers lose tomorrow, the Mets will be in first place. Likewise, if the Dodgers win and the Mets lose, the Dodgers will be in first.

If both teams win, they will be tied for first. A win would put either team ahead of the Red Sox because the Sox (2-0-3) have only 2 wins.
